



Combining Prayers Due to Work or Study Commitments





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Muslims are required to perform five daily prayers at specific times. However, in non-Muslim countries, work and study commitments can make it challenging to observe these timings. Key issues include:

1. **Work Schedules:** Long or inflexible work hours can conflict with prayer times.
2. **Study Commitments:** Students may have back-to-back classes or exams that overlap with prayer times.
3. **Short Time Windows:** In some regions, the time between prayers is very short, making it difficult to perform each prayer on time.

These challenges have led to the consideration of combining prayers, raising questions about its permissibility.

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Rulings and Scholarly Opinions

Islamic teachings emphasize the importance of performing prayers at their designated times. However, scholars have provided various rulings to address the practical challenges faced by Muslims in non-Muslim countries.

1. Permissibility Viewpoint

Some contemporary scholars and fatwa councils permit combining prayers in cases of necessity. The rationale includes:

Necessity: Addressing the practical need to accommodate work and study commitments.

Ease and Flexibility: Ensuring Muslims can fulfill their prayer obligations without undue hardship.



For example, the European Council for Fatwa and Research and the Assembly of Muslim Jurists of America (AMJA) permit combining prayers under specific conditions, such as during periods of short daylight hours or when work commitments make it difficult to pray on time.

2. Prohibitive Viewpoint

Other scholars discourage or prohibit combining prayers except in specific cases such as travel or severe weather. Their arguments include:

Maintaining Timeliness: Emphasizing the importance of observing prayer times as prescribed.

Historical Practices: Citing historical practices where prayers were not combined except in specific circumstances.



The Permanent Committee for Research and Fatwa in Saudi Arabia generally prohibits combining prayers due to work or study commitments, emphasizing the importance of maintaining the prescribed prayer times.

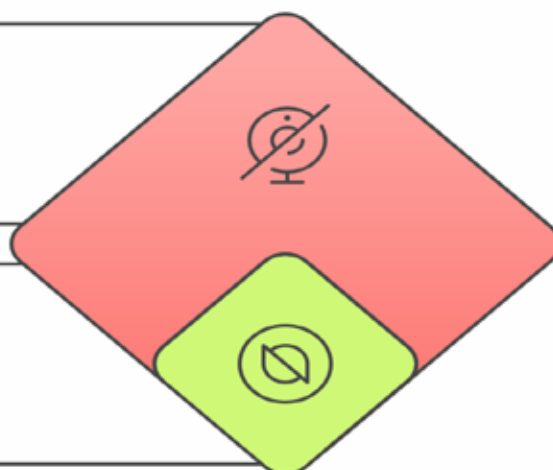
Islamic Prayer Combination Rulings

Prohibition

Discourages prayer combination except in specific cases

Permissibility

Allows prayer combination in necessity



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Evidence and Considerations

Supporting the permissibility of combining prayers:

Ease and Flexibility: Facilitating prayer obligations without undue hardship.

Hadith Evidence: The Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) combined prayers on certain occasions to avoid hardship for his followers (Muslim, hadith No. 705).

Opposing views highlight:

Maintaining Timeliness: Emphasizing the importance of observing prayer times as prescribed.

Historical Practices: Maintaining traditional practices to uphold the sanctity of prayer times.
